Joyce fans celebrate Bloomsday June 12

For 20 years, the Worcester County Poetry Association has been sharing James Joyce's seminal novel "Ulysses" on the streets of Worcester every June 16, or "Bloomsday," so named for the novel's protagonist, Leopold Bloom. And once again, literary enthusiasts will roam the city, bringing the classic book to life with their voices in a rambling all-day event.
